College of the Sequoias Agriculture Division Ornamental Horticulture Program Advisory Committee

Meeting Summary- Wednesday, May 14, 2014

Location: Tulare College Center Room B124

**Time:** 5:00pm

Members in Attendance: Bob Ludekens, Michelle LeStrange, Sal Soriano, Steve Veyna, Joel Brown, Mark Clark, Susan Long, Fernando Fernández

Members Absent: Phillip Cox, Andres Fernandez, Jim Beam

Faculty Lead: Fernando Fernández

The meeting was called to order at 5:05pm by committee Chair, Bob Ludekens. Mr. Ludekens highlighted some of the future plans related to the OH Unit. As part of the future plans he emphasized the following items:

- 1. Selection and acquisition of a soil mixer (Part of the original equipment list)
- 2. Selection and acquisition of a canning machine(Part of the original equipment list)
- 3. The need to expand the soil mixing area to accommodate the soil mixer and canning machine (Limited area is currently available for these two pieces of equipment to be installed side by side)
- 4. Posible expension of the Shadehouse (Current Shadehouse has limited space)
- 5. Enclosure of the OH Laboratory (Currently the OH Lab has open sides and does not meet all educational needs, enclosing the room will allow the space to be used during rainy and windy weather conditions)
- 6. Faculty and students continue working on making changes to the irrigation systems to make the growing areas and greenhouses fully functional

Bob requested that Fernando give a summary of the work that students have done during the year at the OH Unit. Fernando reported that the following improvements or changes have been completed:

- 1. The irrigation systems for 7 of the 12 growing areas in the nursery have been modified and are now fully functional.
- 2. Seven of the 12 nursery growing areas have been resurfaced with new gravel and the drainage system has been modified to allow for proper drainage.

- 3. The irrigation systems inside the greenhouses and the Shadehouse were adjusted to meet the educational needs for the semester. The irrigation systems in the greenhouses and the shadehouse will need to be modified to make them functional.
- 4. The trellis on 4 out of 6 growing areas has been adjusted and is now functional.
- 5. The ground cover used for weed control on the growing nursery blocks has been removed from 7 of 12 areas due to improper installation. The removal of the ground cover was necessary to make adjustments to the irrigation systems and to resurface with the new gravel. The groundcover will be reinstalled on selected growing areas.
- 6. Shelving in the Nursey Storage Building, and the Landscape Management buildings was adjusted to be able to use the space effectively.
- 7. The soil sanitizer was purchased and installed. The soil recycling area is now fully functional.
- 8. Tables purcheased for the sales area were installed and are in used.

The request for Carl Perkins VTEA funding was reviewed. Fernando presented the 2014-2015 VTEA request and gave a description of how those funds will be utilized. The committee approved the request as presented. Fernando informed the committee that the OH Program had received "Above-Based Budget" funding for the 2013-2014 fiscal year. Fernando describe the intended use of those fund.

Fernando gave an overview of all the current AS Degree and Certificate requirements in the program. He reported that all courses in the OH Program have beed revised and entered into CurricUNet. He presented three "Revised Certificates" for review and approval: Floral Technology, Ornamental Horticulture: Retail Nursey, and Landscape Design. Content of the revised certificates was reviewed. The committee approved the revisions as presented. Fernando will work on the revision of the Landscape Management Degree and Certificate requirements, and the Ornamental Horticulture Degree and certificate requirements.

Bob encouraged all committee members to provide input on the current skills needed in the industry. He emphasized the need to maintain the curriculum aligned to industry needs and standards in order to prepare students for the workforce.

Fernando informed the committee of the changes to the Annual Program Review Process. He reported that each Program within the Agriculture Division will have its own Program Review report and that it will be completed on a yearly bases.

Bob will be looking at posible dates for the next meeting. He called for updates to the contact information for each member. He will send a meeting notice to all members.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:30pm.

Plan, organize, direct, or coordinate activities of workers engaged in landscaping or groundskeeping activities, such as planting and maintaining ornamental trees, shrubs, flowers, and lawns, and applying fertilizers, pesticides, and other chemicals, according to contract specifications. May also coordinate activities of workers engaged in terracing hillsides, building retaining walls, constructing pathways, installing patios, and similar activities in following a landscape design plan. Work may involve reviewing contracts to ascertain service, machine, and work force requirements; answering inquiries from potential customers regarding methods, material, and price ranges; and preparing estimates according to labor, material, and machine costs.
