10:00 am-10:45 am	Welcome and Introductions: Dr. Trudy Gerald	Dr. Trudy Gerald, Vice Chancellor of Workforce & Economic Development at the Kern Community College District, welcomed the CVML Steering Committee members. The CVML Steering Committee members and guests introduced themselves. Dr. Gerald shared an update on the hiring process for the new Regional Chair, you can find the job posting here. Bryan Tassey, Dean of Career Technical Education at Merced College, proposed there being a representative of each of the sub-regions in the hiring committee. The Steering Committee agreed. Dr. Gerald asked if anyone was interested to let her know (trudy.gerald@kccd.edu). Bryan Tassey from the North Sub Region, Becky Barabe from the Central Sub Region, and Jonna Schengel from the Central Sub Region volunteered to be considered to serve in the Regional Chair hiring committee.
	Launch CVML: Charles Henkels Natalie Weaver	Charles Henkels, Executive Director for the LAUNCH Apprenticeship Network, updated the CVML Steering Committee on the partnership with Launch to develop a Regional Apprenticeship Sponsorship Strategy work plan, the timeline, and project overview. Charles, and Natalie Weaver, Director of Partnerships and Programs for the LAUNCH Apprenticeship Network, presented the New-Fashioned Education - CVML LAUNCH Update 12-11-23 slide deck. Natalie went over the tentative timeline for the project, and requested a call to action from the Steering Committee members to identify a representative for each college that would be a part of the apprenticeship workgroup. Natalie also shared that they have a rough job description for the Central Valley Regional Apprenticeship Director that will be hired through LAUNCH and will share it with the CVML Steering Committee



	when completed.
	Further discussion on this topic ensued:
	Jonna Schengel conveyed the need to expend funds sooner than the dates indicated on the timeline.
	Becky Barabe shared that the expectation of those interested in the Central Sub Region was that by Fall 2024 they would already have a committee set in place. Becky stated that ideally, they should have the plan ready to review in the second week of June 2024, when the CVML has their Planning Retreat, so they have a group going by July 2023.
	Charles Henkels communicated that the timeline has a broader time gap because the college's contract timelines are different at various institutions. It is possible to condense the implementation areas and accelerate the timeline. Charles does want to emphasize the importance of thinking of this project as a long-term investment strategy. Charles asked to see how many colleges in the CVML are ready to begin the implementation process and requested a list of those colleges, and share with the region, but still have the foundation planning timeline.
	Anthony Cordova expressed that the nine-month gap is a long time to set agendas and establishments. Anthony would like to see more tangible activities in the tentative timeline and would like to accelerate the planning phase. Anthony pointed out that at Bakersfield College, they've already had different committee meetings in their industry sectors. Hence, the timeline is not feasible for them to wait until September 2024 to have industry committee meetings when they are ready now. Anthony is requesting LAUNCH to speed up the process and bring the other institutions that need the assistance up to speed with them. Anthony pointed out that on the timeline, July 2024 states that they will select priority industries, this has already been done and noted in the CVML Regional Plan 24-25, so that part of the timeline can be taken off. There is a greater need to have scheduled meetings throughout the semester with industry partners, when the programs begin to roll out, to ensure successful enrollment in the different programs, and how to get the portability of these programs to the other institutions that need the assistance because they have the workforce demand in their area but don't carry the bandwidth.

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	Fiscal Closeout: Beatrice Licon SWP 1-5 SWP 6 & 7 K12 SWP 4	Beatrice Licon, Director of Programs and Compliance for the CVML, updated the Steering Committee on where they are at regarding their expenditures for SWP 1-5 and SWP 6 & 7. All data has been exported from NOVA. Beatrice has added the total allocations per college to the SWP 6 Regional Projects. If there is a need for a project to be open or closed in regards to SWP 1-5, email Rozanne Hernandez, Dean of Workforce & Adult Education at State Center Community College District, (rozanne.hernandez@scccd.edu) and CC Beatrice Licon (beatrice.licon@kccd.edu). If there are any fiscal questions regarding SWP 6-8, please reach out to Beatrice Licon. Beatrice also emphasized the importance of the colleges' need to report their expenditures in NOVA to meet the Chancellor's office deadlines, previously mentioned by Dalbir Singh.
		For K12 SWP4, Beatrice is currently working with K12 to close out.

		Further discussion on this topic ensued:
		Jonna Schengel asked if there is an accountability or follow up process on NOVA for the leads that don't certify a plan, especially if they haven't done so in a long period of time.
		Rozanne suggested that if this problem arises, contact the lead to try and figure out where the issue is and who has the money that is over allocated in that area. Rozanne also stated that when it comes to accountability, each college who assigns a lead is responsible to create change when that person is no longer there.
		Amani Crosshabeyeh, Director, Workforce Development Programs at Kern Community College District, shared that there is an SWP 1-5 plan in NOVA that she needs to adjust to get certified but received a notification that the Region Wide Allocations are over, how would it be possible to reconcile those so the projects can be submitted and be able to get the reports out? When running into issues like these, what would be the protocol?
		Dr. Trudy Gerald shared how there is a need for a discussion on how to better overcome the barriers that arise in NOVA to ensure we move forward and close out SWP 1-5. Dr. Gerald suggested planning a meeting after the holidays to discuss this topic further.

		career program has partnered with the Junior High School, where they visit the students monthly and
		teach different subjects related to healthcare. The last one taught was regarding vaping and the effect
		of it. Yeni looks forward to expanding their Media, Arts, and Entertaining program with around 6 fund
		Carrie Bloxom (KCSOS) shared that they just wrapped up their East Kern Career Expo in Mojave, CA,
		serving the desert areas in November 2023. They had 53 exhibitors and had 1,000 students. The top
		trades represented were Aerospace, Industrial Automation, and Manufacturing. Carrie shared that the
		are getting ready to plan the Kern High School District's Career and STEM Expo on April 24, 2024. Carri
		also shared that she and Anthony Cordova, Dean of Instruction, Industrial Technology & Transportation
		at Bakersfield College, met with Community Action Partnership of Kern (CAPK), they received a \$5 mill
		award from Bezos to create tiny homes for the families in Kern County. Carrie brought to CAPK's



	attention that Bakersfield College (BC) has a great construction apprenticeship program, and this can be an opportunity to partner together. This discussion is in the beginning stages, and she hopes this will open opportunities for BC students and CAPK.		
	Geographic Solutions: Kris Costa, Vice President of Educational Services/CIO at West Hills College Lemoore, shared that they are fully implemented with Geographical Solutions Virtual Career Center. They have been testing Data Cast, which is a live feed that you can put on your website that provides labor market data. There is also Stand Out, which is an add on that is included in the contract, it is a mock interview platform where students can go on and answer thousands of questions. They can record themselves and share with faculty, job developers, and their student success coordinator to prepare for interviews.		
	TPM Academy RFP: Dr. Gerald shared that the TPM Academy RFP is being developed. You can find the draft here . Dr. Gerlad expressed that they should continue to develop the proposals with the information provided and will be due by February 2024. Dr. Gerald asked how many people anticipated submitting a proposal, if there are no proposals coming in then it wouldn't be wise to move forward with the TPM Academy RFP.		
	Gary Potter shared that this is not for the Community Colleges to apply for, this is for the intermediaries the Community Colleges partner with to apply and run those collaboratives for the colleges.
